What if I want to talk to a professor, coach or staff member?

People responsible for the safety and wellbeing of students are required to share what you tell them with **Pitzer's Title IX Office**. These private resources include faculty, staff, coaches, Student Affairs staff and Residential Life staff. If you speak with them, they must contact the TIX Office, which will follow up with you to offer comprehensive resources and support. It is your decision when or whether to respond.

Pitzer's Title IX Office helps with any situation involving gender-based discrimination. What you tell the office will be kept private, and you can choose to get information about options without disclosing details about what happened or who was involved. The office will ask about your wishes moving forward, and balance your request for next steps with the safety of the campus community.

You can meet with the Title IX Office to do any or all of the following:

- Get info about possible next steps so you can choose what's right for you
- Request support resources only (i.e. housing/academic assistance)
- Make a report and request non-adjudication options, such as contact restrictions
- Start a formal complaint process
