

ADMISSION - BUILDINGS - FACULTY - CURRICULUM

"I am seriously considering a good college and a bright future", "The more information I receive about Pitzer, the more interested I become", "In my opinion, the Claremont group has more to offer" These remarks are among those received with 300 inquiries to date for Fall 1964 admission to Pitzer College. The first class will have 100 girls; eventually, the student body will number 600.

Sanborn Hall dormitory has been started. Its completion is expected in August 1964.

Scott Hall, administrative center, is getting under way. It will have thirteen offices and nine classrooms for the first year's operation. Separate classroom buildings will be added in succeeding years.

Faculty appointments for 1964-65 are being sought and negotiated as early as possible, in order to have a distinguished initial faculty. Of the eight appointments being considered, four will be made in the social sciences, where Pitzer's emphasis lies. Ultimately, a faculty numbering 45-50 will meet teaching needs of Pitzer College and will provide interchange opportunities with the affiliated colleges in Claremont.

A curriculum encompassing social science, humanities, natural science, language and mathematics is planned. Independent study and tutorial work will be fostered during all four years: freshman group projects in the social and behavioral sciences and individual field projects by sophomores will precede independent and honors work during the junior and senior years.

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
