

CURRICULAR OPPORTUNITY

Course registrations this Fall confirm the farsighted plan whereby Pitzer College became the sixth of The Claremont Colleges. The new college, emphasizing the behavioral sciences, has already complemented and enhanced the academic resources of the Claremont group, which includes Claremont Graduate School and University Center, Claremont Men's College, Harvey Mudd College, Pomona College, and Scripps College.

In courses taught by the 13-member Pitzer faculty there are 326 enrollments by students of the other Claremont colleges. Balanced against this interest for our courses is an equally large demand by Pitzer students for courses at the other colleges in Claremont.

The typical Pitzer freshman has coeducational classes in the humanities, in English, and in psychology, sociology, or anthropology. She is enrolled in the "fifth course," an independent study program. And she selects, from offerings in all The Claremont Colleges, a language or physical science.

Thus, the purposeful correlation of the Pitzer curriculum with curricula in The Claremont Colleges advances the opportunity and promise of the Group Plan, and makes the combined educational resources of all the colleges available to every Pitzer student.
